If you have purchased a home that already has a civic address you should [contact the CSRDB](#) office to confirm the correct number for the dwelling. Residents in the process of building a new dwelling can obtain a civic address. Agencies such as Hydro, Telephone and Gas will require this service address prior to allowing a connection. House numbers are assigned only to dwellings and places of business, and not to vacant land.

It is a policy of the Regional District to assign a civic address to every principal-use building in the District. This includes residential, recreational, and commercial structures. If you need a civic address for your building or property, please contact the Planning Department of the Regional District.

Why do we need Property Addressing? Civic addressing helps emergency response personnel, such as fire, ambulance, and police, find your property quickly during an emergency. The RDEK only addresses occupied properties so remote residences can be identified during large emergency events.

Civic addressing is assigned to every occupied parcel in the RDEK, regardless of whether you live on a public or private road.

How do I get a civic address?

Your address is issued by local government, in this case the TNRD. You can fill out the form in this pamphlet to get an address created for your property or the TNRD automatically issues you one at time of Building Permit issuance. If a parcel of land has no buildings (i.e. 'improvements' on your property taxes) there is typically no address and it is identified by its legal description from its certificate of title or PID (Parcel Identification Number).

It is very important to have a site plan to show where a property is accessed. If using a hard copy form, please use the back of the form to draw a detailed diagram of the property boundaries, drive way access and structures. If submitting electronically, please use the [Public Web Map](#) to provide a site plan (more instructions available on the application form).

A fee of \$75.00 is required per address. Unfortunately, we cannot accept e-transfers, over the phone or credit card payment. We do accept cash or debit at the front desk. Address signs are an optional service available for a \$40 fee.

Civic addresses are assigned when a building permit application is received, or in the case of an existing building that requires a number but does not yet have one, upon request by the owner.

How are addresses assigned?

When a building permit is applied for through the Cowichan Valley Regional District, it is sent to the GIS department to assign a civic address. The GIS department uses an address grid that encompasses the entire region to ensure addresses are assigned consecutively and in an order that is easy to understand.

Occupancy will only be granted if you have your valid civic address posted.

Civic addresses are generally issued at the time of application for a building permit. The civic address is based on the location of the driveway serving the property and the location of the building on the property.
