










#### **Overdue:** Three-year analysis


- Canada's public libraries play a crucial role in enabling governments to meet their obligations and strengthen the common good.
- Public libraries offer critical supports, including access to knowledge, culture, health, reconciliation education, belonging, and our democracy.

#### Context

#### **Overdue: Three-year analysis**

- Critical social infrastructure and community hubs
- Expanded roles and mandates to respond to social vulnerability across the country
- Canada (and BC) per capita investments lag behind the G8; post pandemic realities require investments
- Recommendations for Federal and Provincial governments to relieve operational pressures, treat libraries as critical infrastructure and formalize sustainable investment streams

#### Context A perfect storm



### **Budget 2024: assumptions**

- •Right-size, needs-based for all operating expenses
- •Maintain operations and services
- •Above historical increases
- •Capital levy to be established via the review of VIRL's Facilities Policy & Facilities Master Plan

### Largest pressures

•Wages & Benefits up 22% (\$3.5M) to \$19.4M

•2 CA's, Benefits, and removal of vacancy allowance
•Includes savings from exempt complement reduction (5.0 FTE)

•Leases, security and utilities up 37% to \$1.75M

•5-year renewal on several leases & service contracts
•\$600K annual Security, Health & Safety overhead, post-pandemic

### By the numbers

- \$38M, 15% over 2023
- Local government levies will contribute \$32.5M
- \$10 per capita increase, overall

### **Provincial Apportionment**

- 50% Converted Land Value
- 50% Population

- RDN communities comprise 36% of VIRL's service population
- In '24, RDN communities will contribute 36% of the levy
- RDN EA total levy Per Capita is in the middle of VIRL's 10 Regional Districts

### **RDN Communities In Comparison**

- Average of 2.6 VIRL branches per RDN community (based on actual usage), a third above the overall average
- VIRL has 800K items in its physical collection, 80% above the overall average
- VIRL Local government support is below, at or near average in all categories
- VIRL has the lowest levy per branch in the cohort of 8 BC public libraries serving 250K people or more
